







Informative Session – Elections 2022 Embassies in Brasilia



Date and time of the election

- Oct 2nd, 2022 First round of voting
- Oct 30th, 2022 Runoff (if needed)
- From 8:00 am to 5:00 pm Brasilia time (UTC-3)

Positions in dispute

- President and Vice President of the Republic
- State Governors and Deputy Governors
- Senators of the Republic (1/3 of the members)
- Federal Representatives (including District Representatives from DF)
- State Legislators



Majoritarian election

- President and Vice President of the Republic
- Governors and Deputy Governors
- Senators

Proportional Election

- Federal and District Representatives
- State Legislators



Who votes

Natural born and naturalized Brazilians

Voting characteristic

- Mandatory
 - Over 18 and under 70 years old
- Optional
 - Over 16 and under 18 years old
 - Over 70 years old
 - Illiterate over the age of 16



What to do when you don't vote

- Mandatory vote
 - Justify absence after election; OR
 - Pay a R\$ 3.51 fine allocated to the Party Fund
- Optional vote
 - No action

Penalty

- Mandatory without justifying absence nor paying the fine
 - cannot enroll in, invest in, or take office in any public contest or examination for a public office or function;
 - cannot receive wages, remuneration, salary, or income from a public office or employment;
 - cannot enrol in public bids;
 - may not renew enrollment in an official educational establishment



Voting procedure

- 100% eletronic
 - More than 570 thousand electronic ballot boxes are in the Electoral Justice premises
 - 118 million voters are already able to vote with biometric identification
 - Those without biometrics vote with an official ID card with a photo

Results of the election

- Ballot box bulletin
 - At the end of the voting session (5 pm), all polling stations issue a ballot paper with the number of votes in that section. The document is issued in five copies, of which one is made available to the political parties at the polling station itself.
- Ballot bulletin in hand
 - The printed bulletins have QR codes that can be used to compare this printed result with the digitally counted one.
- The release of the results is done by the TSE in Presidential elections, and by the Regional Courts in State-Level elections. This is done within a few hours after the closure of the election session.



Main milestones of the Election Calendar

Candidatures

- July 20th to August 5th Party conventions
- August 15th Last day to submit the candidature applications (ordinary)
- September 12th Last day to substitute candidacies, except in case of death

Political Campaign

- July 5th until the convention date Intra-party campaign
- August 16th Beginning of general campaigning
- August 26th to September 29th Radio and TV advertising (1st round)
- September 29th Last day for rallies
- September 30th Last day for printed press advertising
- October 1st Last day for distribution of graphic material, rallies and parades



Main milestones of the Election Calendar

Rendering of Accounts

- September 9th to 13th Partial accounts rendering
- September 15th Disclosure of partial accounts on the internet
- November 1st Last day for submission of 1st round's financial statements
- November 19th Last day for submission of 2nd round's financial statements

Results and Certification

- October 2nd 5pm: beginning of vote tallying disclosure 1st round
- October 2nd to 15th Availability of the 1st round's data for verification
- October 30th 5pm: beginning of vote tallying disclosure runoff
- October 30th to November 12th Availability of runoff data for verification
- December 19th Last day for certification by TSE of the elected candidates



Elections in numbers (2018 scenario)

Positions in dispute

- 1 President of the Republic
- 27 Governors of States and Federal District
- 27 Senators of the Republic
- 513 Federal Representatives
- 1,059 State Legislators (and District Representatives)

Candidates

- 14 for President of the Republic
- 202 for Governors of States and Federal District
- 5,358 for Senators
- 8,588 for Federal Representatives
- 18,922 for State Legislators (and District Representatives)



Elections in numbers

Structure of Elections

- 5,568 Municipalities
- 26 States and 1 Federal District
- 460,000 polling stations (estimated)
- 570,000 electronic ballot boxes (estimated)
- 95,000 polling places (estimated)

People involved

- 152 million eligible voters (approximately)
- 22,000 Electoral Justice officials and employees (approximately)
- 2.2 million pool workers and logistical support (approximately)
- Armed Forces deployed to allocate ballot boxes in hard-to-reach places

Political parties in numbers

- 32 political parties registered at TSE
- 16,164,714 affiliates
- 54% Men
- 46% Women
- 34.7% Aged between 45 and 59
- 20% Aged between 60 and 69
- 19.7% Aged between 35 and 44
